# "He saw and he believed."

#### Illustration

Resurrection as a metaphor has penetrated human society. Judaism, Islam and Christianity all believe in the resurrection at the end of time. Even those who do not believe this apply the metaphor of "resurrection" to arts, to politics, to any human endeavour. Countries, political parties, art forms are always being proclaimed by the media as a "resurrection". It is good that the word is being used but it is dangerous for Christians. We must not allow the resurrection to be no more than a metaphor. When we hear the word "resurrection", it often means no more than that something which used to be popular has become popular again. The resurrection of Christ means much more than that. It means that a new kind of human life has begun, a new life beyond our imagination but not beyond our hope.

We should also remember that the resurrection of Christ involves the cross. Death and resurrection go together in Christ. As St Paul says in the letter to the Romans, to take but one of his many sayings about the power of the death and resurrection of Christ: "Christ Jesus... not only died for us – he rose from the dead, and there at God's right hand he stands and pleads for us."

So we have to be careful about metaphors of resurrection. Yes, it is true that there are resurrections in this life. The Church herself has often seemed to die, yet has always come back to life; a fire that cannot be wholly extinguished. We should never assume, either, that an old evil might not come back to haunt us. Yet the resurrection of Christ is more than an event in human history. The real resurrection is what we experience in prayer when we meet the living Christ.

# Gospel Teaching

It is strange how some of the resurrection readings do not involve a meeting with the risen Christ. Instead we are told about the stories of those who come to the empty tomb. Perhaps this is because Jesus does not reveal himself to his disciples until they have been prepared to meet him. They have to look inside themselves first. The apostles deserted him. On Holy Saturday, they had to consider what they had done. Now they hear something that suggests that this is not the end. He had said he would rise again, but they had not listened. Do they believe now that it might have happened? Are they willing to accept a risen Christ? If it is true, then everything is changed, but change is frightening. Our own faith in the resurrection is like that. To find faith, we first have to look inside ourselves, to really think about what we have become and who we truly are.

Peter and the beloved disciple behave differently. The disciple who knew what it meant to be loved by God believes before Peter. They both have the same evidence, the same reason to believe, but one had already experienced the love of God. Whoever he was, he had stayed at the cross, had entered into the reality of love revealed by the cross, with Mary the mother of Jesus, and so was prepared to meet Jesus. For Peter it was different. He had run away; he had failed. Yet he too came to the tomb. If he has no willingness to believe in Jesus, Peter would have stayed away.
