## REFLECTION FOR THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT

This past Wednesday, we celebrated the feast of the Immaculate Conception—Mary was prepared from the very beginning to be the mother of the Savior. I think another way of saying this is that God takes the long view of things. We are saved by Christ's death and resurrection on the cross, but we don't stop there. We talk about salvation history, how God planned from the beginning to not only redeem his people, but also to invite them into his own life, the life of the Trinity.

Shortly, we shall enter into the octave before Christmas. This starts on the 17th. It's a kind of countdown to Christmas. The antiphons for the Magnificat, which is recited or sung during Evening Prayer, are usually termed the O antiphons. We're familiar with them, because they form the basis of the Advent Hymn "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel." "O come, thou Wisdom from on high." "O come, thou root of Jesse, come." "O come, thou dayspring." We keep piling on the epithets or phrases to try to convey the many ways that we talk about Christ's coming for our salvation.

We are also drawing near the readings for the Christmas event. I want to draw your attention to the prologue of the Gospel of Matthew. The evangelist lays out the genealogy of Jesus, how his family goes back, not only to Abraham, our father in faith, but right back to Adam, our father in humanity. The author organizes it into three groups of fourteen generations, in which the entire history of the Jewish people is set out. He imposes order out of what could be chaos. In other words, God has it all in hand. God knows what he's doing.

What can we say about this genealogy? It's a very strange genealogy, to say the least. Unusual for the time, there are women in the genealogy—Rahab, Tamar, Ruth, and finally Mary herself. You have villains and heroes. You have people who are deserving of our admiration, and other people for whom the verdict is still out. It is said that God writes straight with crooked lines. God takes the long view.

This way of seeing things and preparing for the future is appropriate for our own lives as well. God has prepared for us in some way; we are not an accident of history or biology. Who we are is not determined by one action in our lives but rather by the sum total of who we constitute ourselves to be. And in the end, we can credit who we are to the intervention, to the guidance, to the inspiration of the Holy Spirit.

It's all part of God's plan, and the coming of the Savior is a good time to savor it.
