

Today's Readings

First Reading Joshua 5:9-12

The people prepare to celebrate Passover -a final act of the nation prior to possession of the promised land.

Second Reading 2 Corinthians 5:17-21

We are reconciled to God through Christ.

Gospel Luke 15:1-3. 11-32

The story of the prodigal son -a story of repentance and mercy.

FORGIVENESS + RECONCILIATION = AND HARMONY

Traditionally in the Church, this 4th Sunday of Lent was called Laetare, that is, "Rejoice" Sunday. It's a cousin to Gaudate Sunday (3rd week) in Advent. These Sundays mark the half-way marks through these two seasons set aside for special reflection, self-denial and repentance. The themes for the Readings, therefore, include forgiveness and reconciliation -- new beginnings, with a joyful change of attitudes and efforts in our daily living.

In 1st Reading, Joshua 5:1ff, The Lord said to Joshua at the brink of the Promised Land: "Today I have removed the reproach of Egypt from you." How exciting that must have been for those who, at long last, would be able to celebrate their sacred Passover in their own land, this land promised to them so many hundreds of years before.

In the 2nd Reading, these words of Paul are filled with the excitement of the people's new calling in life: "Brothers and Sisters, whoever is in Christ is a new creation. . . . God, who has reconciled us to Himself through Christ, and given us the ministry of reconciliation (!), . . . God is reconciling the world to Himself in Christ, NOT counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting to us the message of reconciliation. So we are ambassadors for Christ, as if God were appealing through us". . . , carrying God's gift of reconciliation to others! With such a gift we have been entrusted and have every reason to rejoice!

What a contrast to the attitude of the elder son in the Gospel Reading of today (Luke 15:1ff) Rather than being an ambassador for his father's love and forgiveness to his younger brother, he chose to stand in judgment of his brother's failures and sinfulness, demanding recognition for his own goodness. Probably we have all "been there" at some time in our lives. As I reread the opening line of the Gospel, I wondered where I might find my own face among the gathering crowd: (Imagine the scene; can you find your face?) "Tax collectors and sinners were all drawing near to listen to Jesus, but the Pharisees and scribes began to complain, saying, 'This Man welcomes sinners and eats with them.'" So Jesus then told the story of the Prodigals. ...

(A lovely poem by St. Thomas Aquinas might make appropriate reading and musing right now):

WE ARE FIELDS BEFORE EACH OTHER How is it they live for eons in such harmony— / the billions of stars— When most men can barely go a minute without declaring war in their mind against someone they know. There are wars where no one marches with a flag, though that does not keep casualties / from mounting. Our hearts irrigate this earth. We are fields before each other. How can we live in harmony? First, we need to know We are all madly in love with the same God.
