THE GIFT OF SPEECH

A well-known proverb states that "Speech is silver, but Silence is golden." That, of course, is not always true. It may be true when a speaker is able to speak eloquently and knowledgeably about a specific topic, and the truth might therefore ring out in silver clarity. Likewise, another who knows nothing of the specified topic, best serves the situation—and his own reputation—by refraining from speech, maintaining a golden silence. In this case, yes, speech is silver, and silence is golden.

In the 1st Reading for today, Sirach gives us some good insights into truths about speech: "When a sieve is shaken, the husks appear; so too a man's faults when he speaks The fruit of a tree shows the care it has had; so too does a man's speech disclose the bent of his mind. [Notice in today's Gospel, that Jesus picks up this theme of a tree's bearing fruit]. Praise no one before he speaks, for it is then that men are tested," Sir 27:4-7 (This all holds true of women, too, of course.)

Speech is a powerful gift from God, one that we can choose to use for good or for evil, effective for building up or for tearing down, effective for encouraging others or for belittling them and killing their spirits, for proclaiming the Good News and spreading Truth, or for promoting meanness and injustice through gossip and lies.

This might be a good day to take a look at how we use our gifts of speech and silence, our gifts of "silver" and "gold". Do we publicly use our words to thank God for the opportunities we have to serve others? As parents, as teachers, as leaders of any kind, do we encourage and compliment children, students, co-workers in their efforts. Or do we cut down, discourage, belittle, compare to others, complain about who they are and what they do? Some words of criticism never leave people's hearts, once they cut and hurt. Such speech is not silver. It resembles the husks of Sirach's sieve.

How golden is our silence? Are there times when we OUGHT to speak up for truth and justice, yet maintain our silence out of fear or with the attitude of Cain: "Am I my brothers/sister's keeper?" Silence is truly golden when we spend it in the Presence of God, in His love and wisdom, His beauty and truth. Such silence can then only beautify the silver of our speech in our interactions and loving presence with others. But if, in our "golden" silence, we quietly judge others and stew over angry thoughts and perceived slights, hugging hurts and failures to our hearts in self-pity, then that "golden silence" becomes toxic. Words can be powerful and beautiful. God spoke only One, who says all. It might be good to read the entire chapter of Sirach 27 this week. Verses 4-7 are only a few of its quotable gems!
