"How much do you owe my master?"

A few years before the great global financial crisis began in 2008, a man who worked in the insurance trade was explaining to his friend how when they insured a ship, the company often could not actually afford to pay out, so that company would take out insurance itself for the possible loss, with another company. Sometimes, he said, you would find that this company had also taken out insurance, in case it was asked to pay out. The friend asked what seemed an obvious question: "Who is insuring the ship, then?" The man had to stop and think about this for a moment, and then said, "That's a good question."

Some years after the collapse of 2008, his friend reminded him of this conversation. The man had forgotten it, but he did say that analysis of some companies had shown that they were relying on other companies to pay out, who themselves relied on other companies. Yet it turned out that this could be circular: company A is insured with company B, which is insured with company C, and so on till you come to a company that is itself insured with company A. We are, in effect, living in a world of never-ending debt.

Gospel Teaching

So in fact the unjust steward in today's Gospel parable is, perhaps, on to something, because one solution to the problem of debt is to let people off with their own debt. But the steward does it for unjust reasons, seeking his own benefit. However, remember that all Jesus' parables are about God. To the question, "How much do you owe my master?" — if the master is, in fact, God — the answer is, quite simply, "Everything".

We owe everything to God; not just our life, our existence, but the redemption we are offered in Christ and the promise of eternal happiness. If it were a matter of justice, there could be no possibility of us ever being able to pay off our debts. The saints and the angels joyously live in eternal debt to God, because God is the giver and we – all of us who are part of God's creation – are the receivers. Only pride would make us resent this undeniable truth. It was through pride, and pride alone, that the bad angels fell. Yet it is also true that, because God became incarnate in Jesus Christ, we are allowed to share in the redemption of the world. This is not because God needs us to do it, nor is it because we need to do it. We could perfectly well be redeemed by a simple act of God's mercy. Yet God has decided to give us the greater gift of allowing us to act as givers ourselves. It is a bit like parents giving their children money so that the children can buy them presents.

The unjust steward abuses his master's money, driven by his own self-interest. Yet it is mercy that is the wealth of God that we are to share with others; God is "generous with his mercy", or, in some translations, "rich in mercy", as St Paul tells the Ephesians. The Lord's Prayer speaks of debts as well as sin, because sin is a kind of debt. Yet it is a debt we have no claim on. We forgive the debt of other people's sins against us, because we are in such an enormous debt to God ourselves.

Application

It is not the function of the Church to solve financial problems. Often there are complex reasons behind a financial crisis, which require a great deal of thought and discussion to resolve. Yet at the same time there are also, often enough, simple reasons behind the economic turmoil: greed, dishonesty, pride. Such qualities are very much the concern of the Church. They are sins of the heart.

It is only grace that can resolve the knots which those sins make in people's lives, and only grace can offer the mercy that God has asked us to share with all God's people. Merciful people cut the knot, open the door, lead the way forwards and bring us to heaven. Or, to put it another way, the best kind of economy is an economy of giving, and the best kind of giving is forgiving.
