Today's Readings: First Reading Joshua 5:9-12 The shame of Egypt is taken away but not the memory of Egypt, which will sustain the new life. **Second Reading** 2 Corinthians 5:17-21 The creation of humanity is not yet complete but it continues as an act of reconciliation in Christ. **Gospel** Luke 15:1-3. 11 -32 The story of the prodigal son is not just his story. It is the story of a whole family; indeed it is the story of the family of humankind.

PRODIGAL SON/WELCOMING FATHER

The parable from the Gospel from Luke, which we heard this morning, can be very offensive to people. The Pharisees certainly didn't like it! How come? What's not to like? I mean is, are we not tempted to take heart, when we hear that the Father is ready to welcome the son home after all his profligate living. But there's more to the story than that!

We must remember that you always have to put Jesus' parables into the context that he told them in. In this case, the tax collectors and other sinners were all drawing near to Jesus, not only to listen to him, but to eat with him as well. Eat with him? Sit down at the same table with him? Share food with him? What a scandal! Nice people don't sit down and eat with sinners.

However, the fact of the matter is that the Gospel of Luke is full of people eating and drinking, all the time; in fact, they never seem to stop eating and drinking, to the extent that the images of sharing food and hospitality become one of the major themes in the Gospel as a whole. In Lent, this makes great sense, since we are headed towards Jerusalem and the celebration of the Passover meal.

Notice that this particular issue of food divides the people listening to Jesus. The scribes and pharisees, in particular, were deeply offended because many of their own claims to holiness revolved around what you ate, how you ate, when you ate, and most importantly, whom you ate with. For us, the image of the son returning to the father often stops short at the door of the house, when the father gives him new clothes and puts a ring on his finger, but let's follow them inside, and what do we find? More eating and drinking. The scribes and the pharisees would not have missed that detail.

What can we take away from this parable, especially when we hear it in Lent. One answer is that our own claims to be doing God's will may need to be examined in depth. Are we using them to set up a wall between ourselves and the rest of the human race around us? Have we made ourselves extra-special people, self-righteous people, rather than seeing ourselves as sharing a common humanity with our brothers and sisters?

In Lent, it is time to second-guess our actions. It's a time of self-examination, seeing how we fit into all the relationships that we find ourselves in. And remember that our relationships extend far beyond the narrow confines of our family or our work, in order to embrace our town, our state, our nation, and our world.
