# 17th Sunday in Ordinary Time Reflectionocked

#### BREAD AND LOCKED DOORS

In the Gospel passage, the story about the man who knocks at the door at midnight, asking for three loaves of bread, occurs immediately after Jesus' teaching his disciples how to pray. It's a kind of commentary on what he has just taught them.

On the surface, it's a strange kind of commentary. I wonder why Jesus felt it necessary to frame the Lord's Prayer in this way? What kind of image did his disciples have of the God who created us and maintains us in being? Well, at this remove in time, I'm not in a position to answer that question. The past is indeed a foreign country. However, I can assure you that in our own time and place, Jesus' commentary is VERY relevant. Why? Many people, maybe even ourselves, walk around with an image of a God who is potentially violent, vindictive, spiteful, domineering in the bad sense of the word. ... If we take the Scriptures seriously, that's not what our God is like at all.

A lot of folks think that if they multiply their prayers, telling God what they think God wants to hear, they might just possibly escape the celestial sharpshooter in the sky (You know him?) who is looking for a chance to take us out. They make God so ugly and complicated!

In reality, when you stand before our merciful God and voice (or whisper) the Lord's Prayer, you should be at your simplest and most honest: tell him what you want; tell him what you need; and don't complicate matters. If we do that, we are already at our own ground zero, at our most authentic.

God responds to our prayer. His response is an invitation to trust him. ... In spite of what's written on the one-dollar bill, "In God we trust.", most of us would rather trust in ourselves. "Just let me do it, and I'll be fine." We only call on God, when we're on our last legs, down to our last dollar, and out of solutions. This goit-alone stance is not trust.

God's house is not a locked door. Money troubles, health challenges, roadblocks in personal relationships—you name it—just keep it simple and trust Him.
