

PALM SUNDAY HOMILY

This is not what the disciples expected. Things have gotten out of hand. The disciples enter Jerusalem with trumpets blaring and brass bands on Palm Sunday, and by Thursday evening, it has become very clear that events have outpaced them and can't be fixed. This week is about Jesus the crucified, and we have a choice: we can either go into hiding, as did the disciples, or we can walk along the Via Dolorosa with Jesus, as he carries his cross. We can stand at the foot of the cross in a waiting game with death.

I make the point each year that the churches are full on Good Friday and often empty out for the Easter Vigil. Easter Sunday sees them fill up again, because, in many cases, folks have forgotten what happened two days before. Well, why do they fill to bursting on Friday? The easiest answer is that the betrayal that happened to Jesus happens to people all over the world. As extreme examples, we can cite the numerous murders of Christians in Nigeria by so-called extremists. If you place yourself in a situation like that, a situation not unknown to our SMA missionaries in Nigeria, you might well ask yourself how it is possible to keep moving forward.

We can plan our lives, and I'm sure that the disciples had great plans for what they were going to do with Jesus as their leader, but things did not turn out the way they had envisioned, or, if truth be told, as we have envisioned our own lives. When betrayal, tragedy, ill health, and death itself happen, we experience our own depths, a certain level of vulnerability. We experience a stunned confusion, and we don't know where we are anymore. It looks like Death has won the victory.

Last week, in my reflection on the back side of the bulletin, I said that we must journey on in hope—not an illusory hope for pie in the sky at a later date, but a plenitude (fancy word for fullness) of hope in the present, for the world and our lives to be redeemable.

Regarding Holy Week, there comes a point when we can only communicate our deepest feelings through imagery and ritual. Words sufficient to the occasion fail us. This week, through the celebration of the Easter Triduum, we shall have the opportunity to express what we cannot articulate. But just remember, shining through the events of Good Friday, we can see Easter morning bursting through the backdrop, because you and I, we know the end of the story. And remember, when we start shouting hallelujah on Easter Sunday, it is always in the context of the previous Friday.
