Today's Readings:

First Reading Acts 2:14. 22-33

The humanity of Christ was raised to fulfil the deepest longings of Israel.

Second Reading 1 Peter 1:17-21

The Church is a conversation, as we share our faith. Sometimes we fail to allow the Lord into that conversation.

THIRD SUNDAY OF EASTER REFLECTION

The journey of the two men on the way to the village of Emmaus is more than just another post-resurrection appearance of the risen Christ; in fact, in all the instances, in which Jesus appears in the midst of the disciples, there is always something more going on in the telling.

Today on the road, there is a re-alignment of the thinking of the two travelers. Take a good look at them. They have left the confusion, unpredictability, and danger of Jerusalem behind them. After what happened on Good Friday, nothing made sense. Things were not supposed to turn out this way, if Jesus's entry in triumph into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday was anything to go by. The early disciples had mapped out quite a different ending in their minds.

Take a good look at the way the conversation on the road unfolds. The stranger on the road takes the two men step by step through the Scriptures and points out how the Jewish tradition had always foreseen what had happened to Jesus on Good Friday. You know, we do the same thing during the readings at the Easter Vigil: we pass from Creation, through Abraham, Moses, and Ezekiel, until we come, as the final step and the end of the story, to Jesus.

So, what happens when they reach Emmaus? The two men invite the stranger to come and share the evening meal with them. Don't gloss over this detail, because this is a story of people offering hospitality to a stranger. Anything that happened along the road and anything that will happen at the supper table takes place in this context.

It is the stranger who pronounces the blessing over the bread and breaks it. I find this very strange: wherever I've been in my twenty years in Africa, it's always the householder who pronounces the blessing, even if the priest is there. Very strange indeed. In effect, the guest here has become the host.

The stranger blesses the bread and breaks it, and the eyes of the dinner guests are opened. It is the Lord! And Jesus vanishes! Emmaus is all about the recognition of Jesus. It is about when and how they, and we, recognize him. How do we recognize Jesus, when he has vanished from our sight? ... The answer from the Catechism of the Catholic Church stands us in good stead here: Jesus is present in the Word we share, the ministers who unite us with Christ and the Church Universal, the assembly of the faithful, gathered as the Body of Christ, and most importantly in the bread we break.
