11th Ordinary Reflection

I want to preach on Romans today. This section of Paul's letter is a reflection on Christ dying for the helpless, dying for the sinner, dying for the unjust. Paul says, it might be possible for someone to surrender himself to death for the sake of a just person; maybe he or she would find the courage if the person were really good. Of course, the paradox is that Christ was willing to die for people who didn't fit into the righteous category.

This passage brings to mind the story of St. Maximilian Kolbe, the Polish Franciscan priest who volunteered to die in the place of another prisoner at Auschwitz. I've been there and seen the place. The commandant had selected ten men to die in retaliation for one escaped prisoner, so you can imagine the commandant's surprise when Kolbe requested to take the place of another man who had a wife and child. He feared it was a trick, for as Paul pointed out, it's difficult for anyone to imagine someone giving his life for another.

I certainly think that it's hard for us to imagine. Why do it? What are we proving? Given the brutality of the camps, it was likely that either Kolbe or the saved man would have died under other circumstances. This was a practical situation with far too few eventualities, all of them dependent on the throw of the dice. On the surface, there was a certain futility in the action, because, honestly, no outcome seemed desirable. In Auschwitz, you were supping with the Devil.

If you want to understand why a man—Christ, Maximilian Kolbe, or whoever—is ready to die for another, then you have to go back to the Scriptures. Jesus instructed his disciples to go forth, announcing the advent of the Kingdom of God. The Kingdom of God is at hand! It is the hope of things not seen that allows us, urges us, challenges us, to live and die as Christ did. There is admittedly a certain sense of futility for us in doing so, because we don't know, in terms of factual knowledge, what the outcome will be. We believe. We have faith. And we act accordingly. We are ready as gamblers to bet on the throw of the dice.
