25th Sunday in Ordinary Time Reflection

Is today's reading about the money? Is it about the money? The laborers in the vineyard certainly thought so. ... Is the reading about fairness in employment? ... Yes, but only in a negative sense; i.e. what you and I hope for when we die can't be measured in any terms that we would understand, so there's not much point in trying to measure heaven at all. ... Since the landowner has ignored the conventions of the marketplace, maybe the parable we heard isn't about the wages at all. Well then, what is the parable about? Where should we fix our eyes?

I'm going to suggest that the parable is about the work in the VINEYARD as much as it is about anything else. It's no accident that the parable is set in a vineyard. In the Old Testament the vineyard is often the place where God works. The harvest stands in for the people of Israel. At the same time, the image of the grapes for the prophets conjures up the taste of the wine, the sweetness of raisins, the deep hues of purple and burgundy, the conviviality of sitting around a table with family and friends. In brief, a vineyard is at the nerve center of how Israel understood itself as chosen by God.

How do we fit into this parable? In what sense can we imagine ourselves as the workers in the vineyard? ... And before jumping to the conclusion that I'm talking about Church work, let me point out that God's work is not confined to what the priest does, or what the religious sisters do, or what the catechist does. God's work encompasses EVERYTHING we do, for do we not say that we collaborate in the building up of the kingdom of God. Everything we do is for the glory of God. That's why we revel in the image of being the Body of Christ.

Household cleaning is God's work. Cooking is God's work. Business is God's work. Teaching is God's work. Health care if God's work. Labor at McDonald's and Wendy's is God's work. Picking up the garbage is God's work. You see, the Catholic take on the work we do views everything we do as done for the glory of God. That's why we justifiably take pride in how we work. In Catholic terms we talk about the dignity of labor and the need to combat the dehumanization of people in their workplace.

As Catholics, we also talk about vocation. God calls us to work. The nature of this work may change over time. The venue of this work may change over time. Our self-understanding of who we are through the work we do may change over time. The call may come early or late, at 6 AM or the midnight hour, but the call will come nevertheless. Shall we pick grapes?
